The Follett Higher Education Group has announced it will begin offering textbook rental services at Mid-South Community College this fall. Rent-A-Text gives students an option that could save them 50 percent or more off the price of new books.

In a survey of 1,400-plus students who participated in the test program, more than 90 percent of students surveyed expressed satisfaction.

To participate in the Rent-A-Text program, students must present a driver's license or valid identification card and provide collateral in the form of a credit card number. Participants must have an e-mail or cell phone electronic message address so they can be reminded when to return the book. Texts must be returned to the bookstore by the date on the rental receipt, and Follett will also attach a sticker on rental books.

Program participants must be 18 in order to sign a rental agreement or have their parents do it.

Not all course materials will be available for rental. Textbooks will be selected based on a number of criteria, including saturation of a title, breadth of customers using the title, type of book, and expected life span.
