field of study because I'm a kind-hearted person. I love to help people as much as possible to make sure their needs are taken care of."

Initially interested in becoming a registered nurse, she changed her mind while watching physical therapists work during the clinical component of her Nursing Assistant class at MSCC. Her immediate goal is to become a physical therapist assistant and pursue additional education and training after that.

"I'm keeping my options open right now," Farmer said. She has earned 35 hours at MSCC and is taking 13 more this semester. After finishing at Mid-South, she will transfer to a regional college or university that offers physical therapy assistant training.

"I am so grateful to receive this scholarship," she said. "My grandmother is helping me pay my expenses from her savings, so this really helps."

The Quota Club, chartered in June 1954, participates in numerous community projects. Demonstrating its "We Share" motto, the club assists individuals who have hearing and speech impairments as well as disadvantaged women and children.
