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MSCC Students to Graduate from STAND Foundation Leadership Class

Eighteen Mid-South Community College students who began taking classes in January will graduate from The STAND Foundation Edward Coleman Leadership Institute on Wednesday, May 9.

Recognition of the first STAND (Strive Toward A New Direction) graduates at MSCC will be held at 3 p.m. in the Wilson Conference Center in Magruder Hall on the

college's South Campus.

Dr. Christopher Davis, assistant professor of homiletics at Memphis Theological Seminary in Memphis Tenn., is scheduled to address graduates and guests at 4 p.m. Davis, who spoke at the first training session in January, is a native of Proctor, Ark., and a graduate of West Memphis High School.

He is senior pastor of St. Paul Baptist Church and leads one of the most vibrant churches in Memphis. He has been noted as one of "20 to Watch" by "The African-American Pulpit."

The local training, a collaboration between the College and the STAND Foundation with funding from MSCC's Title III Predominantly Black Institutions (PBI) Grant, featured innovative and action-oriented leadership instruction designed to empower participants with tools and skills to improve themselves and their communities.
