Dr. Small is continuing her administrative responsibilities for planning, institutional effectiveness including academic assessment, and accreditation. In addition she has assumed responsibility for the Productivity Program, for coordinating catalog and Employee Handbook revisions, and for coordinating HLC Data reports and designated reports to the Arkansas Department of Higher Education.

"Dr. Small, a long-time MSCC team member, is currently leading our accreditation efforts for the Higher Learning Commission," Dr. Jones said. "She has displayed a willingness to serve in a variety of roles and will take on additional responsibilities both in assessment and academics."
